Car park


A reminder that the Cobham car park off Ilam Road is NOT a drop off zone for Tuia Burnside whānau. This includes NOT parking in the disabled car parks! The top car park by the dental clinic is available should you need to drop your child off and don't wish to drop them off on Ilam Road.

Attendance and sickness

The current Government is having a strong focus on kura/school attendance, and while I am in full agreement that we need our ākonga/students attending kura this comes with conditions. Already we are struggling to find relieving teachers due to staff sickness, so we ask that if your child is unwell to please keep them at home.

Just make sure that you let us know when your child is unwell, so that we can record the absence as being justified and not as truancy. Also please note that taking a holiday during school time is also classified as an unjustified absence.

The data below shows our overall attendance figures for Term One. Only 68% of our ākonga attend school over 90% of the time (equivalent to up to 5 days off across the term).



While a day a week may not seem like a lot of time off school it all adds up over time and will quickly have an ongoing impact on your child's learning.

If your child is missing	That equals	Which is	And over 13 years
Half a day per week	20 days per year	1 month per school year	Almost 1.5 school years
1 day per week	40 days per year	2 months per school year	Almost 2.5 school years
2 days per week	80 days per year	4 months per school year	Almost 5 school years
3 days per week	120 days per year	Over half a school year	Almost 8 school years

1 or 2 days a week doesn't seem much but...

If you are having issues with getting your child to school please let us know, so that we can work together to find a solution before bad habits are formed.


Date: Sunday the 23rd of June. Time: 9:30am-11:30am. Location: Tuia Burnside Primary field, up the back on the rocks.

AKO - Aroha Kaha Ora

Each fortnight we have a focus on our positive behaviour for learning (PB4L). This is where we can earn AKO rewards when we show the expected



behaviours at school. We complete our lesson and review it throughout the week. Teachers focus on one particular behaviour to reward over this time but the expectation is that we are showing all expected behaviours.

We have included the information from our behaviour matrix as it might be useful for you to know what your child is learning to do at school and how they are earning AKO rewards. You could ask them if they have earnt any that day and how they did it.


On the playground, we use AKO by:


- Taking turns

- Being problem solvers
- Walking our wheels inside the school grounds
